

## Early Families Of Limington Maine

"This book is divided into eight sections: a general introduction to the library, articles on genealogies and manuscripts, regional studies--Ne England, beyond the Northeast, Canada, and the British Isles and Ireland--and methodological articles on diverse topics" -- Introduction, p. ix.

Arthur McArthur (1790-1874), son of John McArthur and Mary Miller, was born in Limington, Maine. He married Sarah Prince Miltimore (1895-1881) in 1829. They had six children. In this lavishly illustrated volume, which features over 200 halftones and sixteen color plates from public and private collections, distinguished experts in history, art, and genealogy explore the important but often overlooked relationship between material culture and family history in New England during the seventeenth, eighteenth, and nineteenth centuries. The contributors examine a broad range of family record artifacts, including genealogical samplers, mourning embroideries, pen-and-ink family registers, gravestones, heraldica, textiles, furniture, silver, and portraiture. An indispensable resource on the world of decorative arts and its significance in preserving family identity, this beautiful work provides much valuable information and research clues for modern-day genealogists. Limington, (originally called Little Ossippe), was a part of the "Ossipee Tract" purchased by Francis Small in 1668 from an Indian sagamore. As early as 1771, the Small heirs, then living in Scarboro and Cape Elizabeth, Maine, were taking an active interest. 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England the son of David Woodson. He married 1) Margaret Hornabrook before 8 Sep 1708; 2) 12 Feb 1723/4 Abigail Abbott at Berwick, Maine. He died before 1770 in Berwick, Maine.

Jonathan Watson was first noted as being in Dover, New Hampshire in 1672. He married (1) Abigail Dudley, ca. 1675 in Exeter, New Hampshire. He married (2) Elizabeth Beard by 1678. Descendants lived primarily in New Hampshire, Maine, and Massachusetts.

Drawn from a wide variety of sources, including town records, the day books of Francis Meeds (which contain a year-by-year record of deaths in the town 1816-1845), newspapers and various private collections. The genealogy section is omitted.

James McCourt (1814-1893), of Scottish lineage, immigrated from northern Ireland to Canada or Mooers, New York, and married Margaret Young in 1837/1839. They lived in Mooers, New York, then Champlain, New York, and then moved to Sand Lake, Polk County, Wisconsin. Descendants and relatives lived in New York, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Montana, Oregon, California, Washington, Alaska and elsewhere. Includes other ancestors and relatives in New England and elsewhere, and some in New Brunswick and elsewhere in Canada. John McKenney lived probably in Scarborough, Maine. His son, Robert, was born ca. 1675 and married in Portsmouth, New Hampshire to Rebecca Sparks.

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Matthew Young (ca. 1785-1858) was born in Scotland and came to Canada between 1819 and 1823. He was in Hemmingford, Québec in 1851. The family later moved to Wisconsin.

John MacKusick emigrated from Great Britain to America ca. 1720 as a young man, settling in New Hampshire. He married Mary Barker before 1739/40.

William Day's family had been in America some time before his birth in Maine in 1731. About 1755 he married Dorothy Littlefield. They had ten children and this book makes the attempt to list all the descendants to the present time. One of his descendants Henry Eastman Day joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and this branch of the family now live in Utah while many of the descendants still live in New England.

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
