This report summarizes highlights of the work of the Policy Research Initiative over the past two years. The report is organized according to the structure of the Initiative, which established four interdepartmental networks that examined the major socio-economic or horizontal policy challenges facing Canada over the medium term. After an introduction to the Initiative, section 2 provides an overview of each network's research approach, key findings, and future priorities. This is followed by sections summarizing findings of issues investigated and future areas for research in each of the four networks: growth, human development, social cohesion, and global challenges & opportunities. Issues

discussed include the role of macroeconomic policies, productivity, regional economic growth, income inequality, health determinants, indicators of social well-being, community identification, networking and partnerships, implications of changes in social cohesion, the changing global environment, the policy research process, the knowledge-based economy, and participation in the information society. Pathways of Human Development uses theoretical perspectives from developmental, social, and behavioral sciences to examine the many ways that individuals, families, and communities intersect and interface. Focusing on the impact of change on human development, including its antecedents, processes, and consequences, the chapters examine a range of topics such as health and adaptation; social anxiety disorder; protective factors and risk behaviors; parent-child relationships; adolescent sexuality; intergenerational relationships; family stress and adaptation; and community resilience. By extending human development theorizing across these pivotal life-changing issues, this volume offers a comprehensive map of the trajectories of development among individuals, families, and communities.

The book concludes with a focus on the development of aesthetic appreciation and artistic activity in childhood and adolescence, including, for example, how a child's developing theory of mind affects appreciation for the arts, and how developing empathy and emotional regulation contribute to the cognitive and affective underpinnings of acting in adolescence. As a whole contributors explore the developmental, sociocultural, and evolutionary processes that make the creation and experience of art possible. Intended for researchers and advanced students in both human development and the arts, this book will also serve as a textbook for advanced courses on psychology and the arts and/or special topics courses in cognitive and/or human development.

The final chapter considers options for an interdepartmental framework and process to co-ordinate policy research.

Violence in families and intimate relationships affects a significant proportion of the population—from very young children to the elderly—with far-reaching and often devastating consequences. *Cruel but Not Unusual* draws on the expertise of scholars and practitioners to present readers with the latest research and thinking about the history, conditions, and impact of violence in these contexts.
