Specifically, it offers insights into a range of pedagogical practices, based on research or long experience, related to various topics pertaining to the general theme of this edited volume. Such topics include vocabulary teaching in English for Specific Academic Purposes courses, the cultivation of intercultural awareness in multicultural schools, the use of literature in the FL classroom, the enhancement of students' reading literacy, the importance of motivation and peripheral difficulties in conjunction with dyslexia, and the use of reflective practice for teacher development.

Words are considered as the 'building blocks' of a language. Learning vocabulary is a fundamental step of learning a foreign language/second language especially in the initial phases of the L2 learning. Currently, there has been an increasing focus on second language/foreign language vocabulary learning and vocabulary learning strategies (VLSs). More attention has been given to vocabulary because, without doubt, learning an L2 vocabulary is far more important than anything else in developing the knowledge of that language. However, vocabulary learning and teaching have been neglected for decades. Learners did not pay substantial attention to vocabulary and teachers have taught a great deal of grammar topics rather than vocabulary. Students, when they travel, do not carry grammar books but dictionaries. Therefore, the aim of the study was twofold: firstly to reveal the most and least frequently used VLSs by students; secondly to investigate the role of gender in the use of these strategies. Two research methods were used to achieve the aims of the study; a questionnaire survey and an interview session.

Although proficiency in vocabulary has long been recognized as basic to reading proficiency, there has been a paucity of research on vocabulary teaching and learning over the last two decades. Recognizing this, the U.S. Department of Education recently sponsored a Focus on Vocabulary conference that attracted the best-known and most active researchers in the vocabulary field. This book is the outgrowth of that conference. It presents scientific evidence from leading research programs that address persistent issues regarding the role of vocabulary in text comprehension. Furthermore, it deals with the points that are involved in presenting and demonstrating vocabulary and it also focuses on the teachers and learners and which roles they play in the whole process of vocabulary acquisition in the EFL classroom. It is important to see that the teacher needs to work actively with the students on the process of acquiring new vocabulary and the students need to be involved in the learning process. The teacher needs to show the students the necessity of learning vocabulary since this is the most important part of foreign language learning because without vocabulary they will not be able to communicate and understand text that are written in a foreign language. In order to be able to speak a foreign language properly, the students need to learn vocabulary because otherwise they will not be able to express and articulate themselves in a way that other students or native speakers of English can understand them.
