Appendices are added for Sunday matins, major fixed feasts such as Nativity, Theophany and other Feast days of Martyrism saints. But since this volume is not arranged according to the fixed calendar which lists all the saints and fixed feasts for each day of the month, a suitable companion would be a Menaion, which provides a fuller treatment of the major feast days, and the flow of church seasons.

The Prayer Rule of the Theotokos has come down to us through the notebook of the great 19th Century Russian Orthodox saint and mystic, Seraphim of Sarov. He prayed this beautiful prayer everyday. It is recorded in the writings of a spiritual son of St. Seraphim, Father Zosima, that this Rule was originally revealed by Our Blessed Lady in the 8th Century, but it came into disuse and was all but forgotten for hundreds of years before Seraphim made it known again. The practice of reciting the Angelic Salutation, "Rejoice, O Virgin Theotokos..." 150 times, after the pattern of the Psalter, dates back to at least the 4th Century when the monks of the Egyptian Thebaid are said to have prayed in this way. The Prayer Rule as prayed by Saint Seraphim includes beautiful, full-color iconographic illustrations for each of the fifteen mysteries of the Rule. The introductory prayers for each mystery are those of St. Seraphim, himself. The concluding prayers for each mystery were written by a nun who was a disciple of the saint. (Second Edition) Since it began more than two millennia ago, Christianity has given birth to a wide range of traditions, covering most of the languages and cultures of the earth. Among the most ancient of these, the Syriac speaking churches occupy a special place: they alone are using what is considered to be the mother tongue of Jesus himself, Aramaic, which is also one of the two languages of the Old Testament. More than a source of mere linguistic curiosities, the Syriac churches have also preserved a precious variety of rites and prayers that form more than a set of scattered jewels: what they offer are a true way of life and, in particular, a life of prayer, which is not only rooted in a single theological vision, but also offer man a chance to reconcile his spiritual life with the cycle of nature that he experiences each day, week, month, or year of his life. The present book offers a translation of one of these traditions: the weekly prayer cycle of the Syriac Orthodox Church of Antioch, that is, the breviary gathering the text of the seven services of each day of the week, except for some of the services of the first day, whose text changes every week. The Syriac text is here first translated once in an interlinear form in order for the Syriac learner to be able to follow and understand the services without impediment, and it is translated a second time in plain English at the bottom of each page. Before the translation, an essay will show the link between the weekly prayer cycle and the cycle of nature which is displayed across the sky, tied to the movement of the sun for the days, the phases of the moon for the weeks and the months, etc. This reflection aims at the nurturing of a stronger bond with the sacred, through the conjunction of prayer with a deep awareness of the experience of the flow of nature.

If the divine liturgy really is as beautiful as we claim, wouldn't more people attend? Wouldn't the church grow? Driven by our desire for growth, we count, we analyze, we make charts, and we strategize, but often with few discernible results. That is probably the result of focusing on secondary aspects of church life. As we know, the very existence of a church is a gift of God's presence and not the result of any particular actions taken by human beings. For that reason, church is primarily about being something rather than doing or achieving something. So the growth of the church is not reflected in ever-increasing numbers, dollars, and activities, but rather in steadily growing conformity to the divine ideal. So in order to evaluate ecclesial growth, we will first have to ask what the church is supposed to be. One answer to that question is captured in the four marks of the church given in the creed: Oneness, Holiness, Catholicity, and Apostolicity. These four characteristics serve as a matrix or framework within which we can focus on the primary aspects of ecclesial being and help it grow and become what it was intended to be.

According to William Leach, religious communities that have come to North America have not been able to withstand the damaging influence of its consumer-oriented society which has subverted ecclesial customs, values, and practices. Rather than resisting, most of these groups have sought to integrate Christianity into the new culture. By doing so, they run the risk of marginalizing the church and fundamentally altering its teachings and practice. Of course, the real danger does not reside in the occasional use of isolated elements of our culture, the unreflected application of any technology available, the replacement of traditional ecclesial practices with the techniques of the business world, or even the substitution of ecclesial foundations of authority. Rather, danger lies in a set of fundamental principles that together define a basic orientation which is naturally and almost mindlessly attracted to these secular devices, sees no harm in them, justifies and amplifies their effects, and effectively supplants the mind of Christ which is supposed to govern the church. This study analyzes and documents the effects of that mindset and calls us back to the biblical and traditional alternatives that alone can bring healing and recovery to the church.
